No rust whatsoever

Myser breaks scoring record as Hornets roll

Casey Myser broke the Medina County career scoring record, but more importantly he set up his teammates for

tremendous success. That was the story Friday night in a Division II, Region 6 quarterfinal, as the top-seeded Highland football team systematically picked apart No. 8 Brecksville 38-7 with another sterling performance in all three phases of

the game.

The Hornets (11-0) advanced to host fourthseeded North Ridgeville, a 42-7 winner over Whitehouse Anthony Wayne, next week at North Gateway Tire Field. They were pleased with how they competed after getting a firstround bye in the OHSAA's new 12-team playoff format, their second bye of the season after Barberton refused to show up for a Week 7 Suburban League American Conference game.

"It was definitely fun to watch them go out there and play," Highland coach Mike Gibbons said. "Brecksville has some really good players and it was fun to play a good game. I'm excited for our kids. Brecksville played tough."

Myser finished with 14 rushes for 99 yards and three touchdowns to give him 534 career points, breaking the previous area standard of 530 set by Black River's Andrew Vaughn from 2010-13.

record-breaker was a doozy. as Myser broke through the line on a counter and ran through three downfield tackles nearly simultaneously en route to a 33-vard TD with 8:07 left in the third quarter.

That was his last touch of the game.

The Bees (6-5) were clearly dead set on hounding Myser with a 3-3 defense that featured hard-hitting safety Peter Chermonte a yard outside of the box. While Chermonte, by far Brecksville's leading tackler on the season, had another stat-stuffing night, Highland's other key players had a field day.

That began with Grady Gibb, who completed 9-of-9 passes for 141 yards to move his season line to an absurd 81-for-95 (.852) for 1,430. Lucas Gerding (2 carries, 26 yards; 2 catches, 52 yards) and Nick Dobkowski (2 catches, 47) also starred as Highland didn't punt until after a running clock had been obtained.

"I thought we were really efficient," Gibbons said. efficient," Gibbons said. "Casey ran hard, our offensive line blocked really well and we took advantage in the pass game of what they were

The Highland defense got an early interception from Dobkowski and another by Jameson Gordon on Brecksville's opening drive of the second half. The Bees finished with 108 yards total offense on 31 plays if Chermonte's 80-yard touchdown run against the backups is

Brecksville was without 1,158-yard rusher Jacob Eterovich.

"I thought we played really well on defense," Gibbons said. "I'm proud of our kids. We know we have to keep getting better because we have another big challenge coming up next week against North Ridgeville. We're excited."

Highland opened the scoring on a 5-yard Myser run late in the first quarter. Brecksville tried to burn clock each play but ultimately failed, and the Hornets moved to 21-0 on a 12-yard Myser run and Gibb 1-yard sneak to close the first

Myser made the score 28-0 on his highlight-reel 33-yarder, and Dylan Lazar initiated the running clock on a 12-yard run with 6:31 left in the third quarter.

Ionah Kowza, who made 5-of-5 extra points and boomed four touchbacks, added a 36-yard field goal early in the fourth before Chermonte's TD.
